### APRIL SERMONS

*Sunday, April 2, 10 a.m., "The Right Way to Right Speech," Rev. Heather Rion Starr*: Drawing upon a Jewish folktale retold by Simms Taback, we will, all ages together, enact a memorable experience of Motke, the Fish Peddler. Along the way we will celebrate the joys and humanness of being a congregation of more than four generations, sharing in co-creating this community and this multigenerational service today.

Sunday, April 9, 10 a.m., "I'm Still Standing," Rev. Heather Rion Starr: The tendency to reject religious language from our past can eliminate words and concepts that are actually still quite meaningful and resonant in our larger culture. For example: Salvation. What can it mean to a 21\* century Unitarian Universalist to be "saved?" Come join us this Easter Sunday to find out! All are welcome who are committed to respecting others of diverse beliefs, and there'll be an Easter Egg Hunt to follow the service.



Sunday, April 16, 10 a.m., "Road Conditions and Traffic Patterns," Guest Speaker Rev. Kimberley Debus: The journey, whatever it may be, and whomever we may be journeying with, isn't always easy. How we experience it depends on how we handle changing conditions, detours, and rough terrain. We'll explore what that means for our spiritual journeys as well as those we make collectively in our congregations.

Rev. Kimberley Debus is a community minister based in Takoma Park, Maryland. Her ministry inspires artful and art-filled faith. She consults with congregations and religious professionals throughout the denomination. She is joyfully affiliated with the Unitarian Church of Lincoln, Nebraska, and has previously served at the Church of the Larger Fellowship as well as congregations on Long Island and Key West.

Sunday, April 23, 10 a.m., "Appreciating our Interdependent Web of Existence," John Sykes and the UUSD Earth Cares Team of Maggie McLaughlin and Margaret Keefe: What if climate change meant not doom, but abundance? In this reflection taken from author Rebecca Solnit, we will consider giving up things we are well rid of, from deadly emissions to nagging feelings of doom and complicity in destruction.

*Sunday, April* **30, 10** *a.m.*, "*Celebrating Trans Identity," Rev. Heather Rion Starr*: We are in a time of increasing (again) attacks across the country on transgender people of all ages, races, and backgrounds. Today we will reflect upon and celebrate transgender identity and ways that more of us can be stronger allies for our beloveds in the continual struggle for dignity and respect for all people.

## REV. HEATHER RION STARR, MINISTER



Dear UUSD'rs,

"General Assembly" are not the two most exciting words in the English language; I recognize that. However, I'm here to tell you that taking in General Assembly, our annual, mid-June, national denominational conference, whether in-person or online, can be an inspiring and unexpectedly moving experience.

Having grown up Unitarian Universalist, I felt accustomed to being among a relatively small, seemingly-outlier group in our country's faith landscape. So, showing up to my first General Assembly in Cleveland, Ohio in 2001 was incredible for me. I thought I wouldn't know another soul among the thousands there, but I ran into people I *did* know and experienced them anew as leaders within the UU

realm. I soaked in the breadth of interests, issues, and resources within our wide-ranging faith community, most of which I hadn't known existed prior to entering the Exhibit Hall. I walked a canvas labyrinth for the first time, attended a UU youth-led worship service, and discovered that I, for one, find the business of our Association of congregations fascinating. I got to experience firsthand leaders in our shared faith who have now passed on and who I will forever remember for their vision, leadership, humor, and character. (We are nothing if not a faith *filled* with unique characters!) I began to discern that here was a much larger community than my little congregation (Mt. Airy's UU Church of the Restoration at the time, just outside Philadelphia) that I could grow in for the rest of my days, continuing to meet new people, discovering new nuances, and finding new commonalities, fresh perspectives, and always more opportunities to connect, support, volunteer, and learn.

I have attended 19 General Assemblies since that one in Cleveland in 2001—12 in person and seven online. Being an off-site delegate has gotten more-and-more robust and since 2020 and the pandemic has also become the preferred way to participate for many hundreds (if not thousands) more UUs nationally and internationally. It's also gotten vastly more affordable and accessible. If you can find any available time at all in your calendar from the afternoon of Wednesday, June 21 through the afternoon of Sunday, June 25, I urge you to sign up to soak it up: <a href="https://www.uua.org/ga">https://www.uua.org/ga</a>.

sure I am aware of). Don't ever hesitate to nudge me if you don't get a reply right away—sometimes I, too, just need to slow down and reconnect. May the shift into spring be nourishing for us all.

# PAUL BARNETTE, PRESIDENT, UUSD BOARD OF TRUSTEES (BOT) PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE AND BOARD HIGHLIGHTS



# March 1 Business Meeting

**Review/Approve January Month End Financial Documents**: Co-Finance Officer Kent Sprunger reported there has been a successful migration from Power Church to QuickBooks and Breeze. Phase I of the transition is complete. All data entry is now into the new systems. Breeze will manage all contributions and pledges. Later in the spring, Quick Books will have data interface with our banks; this will help with monthly reconciliations. Pledges for FY24 will be in Breeze.

January 2023 income is down, however, pledges year to date are at 73% paid. Expenses for the year are below budget at 53%. For the fiscal year, we are at +\$70,855, which is a healthy position. A motion to accept the January End of Month Financial Documents was

moved and seconded. The motion was passed unanimously by the Board.

**Review Results of "Leadership Pledge Kickoff":** Ron Schaeffer presented an update of the pledge results from UUSD leadership. Of 28 households, 23 have pledged to date, for a total of \$130,800. This is 38% of our pledge goal. It is expected that the remaining five leadership households will pledge before the formal campaign kickoff on March 5<sup>th</sup>. Mean pledging is up by 5%, and the median increase is up by 25%.

**Phase II "Searching for the Future"**/**Stewardship for Us Update:** Board President, Paul Barnette, stated that the weekend of July 28-30, 2023 is set with Mark Ewert. This weekend will be a grassroots-up approach, involving the full congregation in order to gather as much information as possible. The weekend will be facilitated by volunteers from the congregation, with simultaneous workshops taking place on Saturday, July 29.

Discussion of Governance Review Team's (GRT) Recommended Bylaws Revision (Version 11.2): The BOT discussed multiple recommended changes to Article VII, Version 11.2 of the Bylaws with the Governance Review Team led by Mac Goekler. It was agreed that due to time limitations, the review will continue at the next BOT Business Meeting on March 29. The review was stopped at paragraph 7.5. The Board was asked by President Paul Barnette to review the remainder of Article VII prior to the March 29 meeting and send recommended changes to the GRT.

March 14 Planning Meeting Sussex Preservation Coalition Request: Maggie McLaughlin and Jane Gruenebaum briefed the BOT on the mission of the coalition, which was formed approximately six–seven months ago. They are a 501(c)(3) and an all-volunteer organization. Their purpose is to stop destruction of forests

and wetlands in Sussex County, and to work for the enforcement of current county codes and ordinances. On Arbor Day, April 28, 2023, they will be launching a project, the "One Acorn Project," for stronger enforcement to protect our water and woodlands. On Arbor Day, the coalition would like to plant a tree on UUSD property in memory of trees lost due to clear cutting in Sussex County due to development. Maggie McLaughlin is working with the Landscape Committee on this request.

The coalition inquired about the possibility of using UUSD property frontage and parking lot to hold a rally in the spring or fall of this year. The purpose of the rally is to bring public media and government attention to the coalition's proposed tree ordinance draft to be proposed to Sussex County Council about the same time. The coalition would like to have space for a registration tent and several exhibits. The group also plans to march along Lewes Georgetown Hwy for approximately one-mile round trip. The Delaware State Police would be hired to ensure everyone's safety, and the coalition would provide site clean-up as necessary. The coalition's request will have to be forwarded to the Rental & Usage Committee.

Safer Congregation Committee's Presentation of Proposal for Installation of Security Cameras: Ruth Lamothe, Committee Chair, briefed the BOT on the three proposals received for the purchase of security cameras for the outside of UUSD property. After careful review and comparison of the proposals, the committee recommended Alarm Engineering, a company that has served UUSD since 2015 with the installation and monitoring of our fire alarm system. They were the mid-range proposal (\$12,332); however, due to our eight-year relationship with the company and their known responsiveness and professionalism, the committee recommended that Alarm Engineering be hired. The scope of the project will be for the installation of 10 outdoor cameras with multi-tier phasing for the future. Signs will be posted on the property. After monthly costs (after the one-year period) were clarified by Ruth Lamothe, a motion to accept Alarm Engineering's proposal was moved and seconded. The motion passed unanimously.

Discussion of "Searching for the Future" Weekend: Board President, Paul Barnette, stated that two volunteers will be needed to "Train the Trainer" for the weekend of July 28-30. We will also need someone to serve as point of contact. The estimated cost for Phase II is \$5,000 plus meals and travel expenses, which will come out of the restricted fund. Rev. Heather raised the question, "What tool will be used for input from out-of-town members and those who cannot physically be able to attend in person?" The purpose of Phase II is to engage the entire congregation. We need to include everyone in this important weekend. This issue will require further discussion. After some discussion, the motion was proposed and seconded to allow the Board President to sign the contract and the Co-Finance Officer to send the check to Mark Ewert. The motion was passed unanimously.

**Discussion of Potential Dates for Candidate Forum:** The Leadership Development Committee proposed "Lunch with the Candidates" for Sunday, April 16 after the service. The Candidate Forum will take place on Thursday, May 25 via Zoom.

The BOT Planning Meeting takes place on the second Tuesday of the month at 10:00 a.m. and is a hybrid meeting. The BOT Business Meeting takes place on the fourth Wednesday of the month at 3:30 p.m. via Zoom. Please contact Richard Wheeler or Paul Barnette for the Zoom link.

# ADULT FAITH EXPLORATION UUSD HUMANIST GROUP SELF-AWARENESS IS A BASIC PERSONAL GROWTH SKILL

Our Humanism Study Group seeks to inspire each other to grow to become more fully human. There are many ways to do this. Unitarian Universalists have Seven Principles to guide us. The American Humanist Association puts forth Ten Commitments, or virtues, to pursue. Brain science finds that self-awareness leads to activating the mind to building a more balanced and productive life.

Let's look at another path towards personal growth as detailed by Cindy Wigglesworth in her book, *SQ21*, *The Twenty-One Skills of Spiritual Intelligence*. Some call this the next step beyond emotional intelligence. She uses the word "spiritual" in a generic sense that can be translated as "self-actualization."

The SQ21 approach calls for building a fully human life on a foundation of self-awareness. It breaks out five ways to do that. They are (1) awareness of your personal world view, (2) awareness of your life purpose, (3) awareness of your hierarchy of values, (4) awareness of the complexity of your inner thoughts, and (5) awareness of self and higher self. These five objectives are developed extensively in the book. There are many ideas for personal growth in the book. Our group is now focusing on the quadrant titled Self Awareness. You are invited to read the book or come to listen to our impressions as we inspire each other towards Self Awareness at our April 20, 7 p.m. Zoom meeting.

# FINANCE RON SCHAEFFER, CHAIR

We are now eight months through the fiscal year (FY-July 1, 2022, through June 30, 2023), and our financial status remains healthy. Our pledge commitment for the entire fiscal year is \$297,353, and we have collected \$12,874, or 4.3 percent in actual pledge fulfillment in the month of February. Our pledge fulfillment through the first eight months of the fiscal year is 77 percent of our total pledge commitment. Our income and expenses paid through February 28 are as follows:

- Total income: \$266,992 (79 percent of the total budget)
- Total expenses: \$203,250 (60 percent of the total budget)
- The net operations surplus through the end of February: \$63,742.

This is a healthy financial position for the first eight months of the fiscal year.

Our thanks go to all our members and friends who support UUSD. We hope this information is helpful to you, and we welcome your questions and comments.

A side note: For anyone age 73 or older and with a taxable Individual Retirement Account (IRA), you may be required to withdraw a minimum amount of funds from your IRA in any calendar year, known as a Required Minimum Distribution (RMD). You can meet a part of this requirement by withdrawing funds for a qualified charitable distribution (QCD), and that withdrawal helps meet your RMD, but without incurring federal income tax. We are not providing income tax or investment advice, but if you

have an IRA, we recommend you talk with your financial advisor to take full advantage of the Qualified Charitable Distribution.

We have some UUSD members who may not know much about UUSD's legacy gift program, the **Cloud Society**. As you walk through the Gathering Area after a service or meeting, you will notice the Cloud Society plaque on the wall designed and created by Gabriel Zepecki, one of our long-time members. The motif is a tree with roots and gold leaves representing members who have joined the Cloud Society and made a financial commitment to UUSD in their will, life insurance policy, or estate plan.

Currently, we have 40 Cloud Society members, and UUSD has received four legacy gifts.
