Perhaps most tragic is that the theological dogma has managed to conceal, rather than reveal, the spiritual mystery. PRESIDENT'S COLUMN — DEANNA DUBY



I'm reasonably sure that I am not the only member of UUSD who is moved to anger and/or tears almost daily by the news. As I listen to NPR in the car, or read the papers, or watch the evening news, I find that I can hardly bear what is happening in the world, in this country, or even here in Sussex County. And, I find myself seeking solace more desperately than ever before.

Years ago — 1975, to be exact — novelist Anne Rivers Siddons published a book of essays titled *John Chancellor Makes Me Cry*. It's a wonderful book, if a bit dated now. The reason I was thinking of it lately is that the introductory essay in the collection — and hence, the title of the book — is about the fact that she found herself crying nightly as she watched the evening news. (For those of you too young to remember,

John Chancellor was, for a number of years, the anchor for NBC Nightly News.) She was overwhelmed by the many tragic and horrifying things she saw on the news, about which she could do nothing. As she describes it:

"...[T}he tears catch me unaware, a flood tide that rises up through my throat, reddening my eyes and corrugating my face truly hideously, spilling out in a guttering runnel of Revlon, prompting me to strangle and snort and rush into the bedroom for a Kleenex, and my husband to sigh."

My own experience is that a mixture of anger, frustration, and pain well up in me, and I can't find words to express any of it. And, it's not just this insane presidential campaign — though that would be plenty! It's the Islamic State, the Lewes Fourth Street Forest, and mass shootings everywhere. And, all I can do is shout at the computer, radio, or TV, or throw the paper on the floor and scream. Siddons concludes that her feelings arise out of not just the helplessness, but the inability to "transact" — to even talk with someone about it. And, she concludes that she just needs to anchor herself in her own life: "And so I run for comfort to my own life like I run to my refrigerator for Rocky Road ice cream when I can't balance my checkbook."

This all gives me yet another reason to be so grateful for UUSD, and this nurturing community. We share so much, and support each other in our happiness and our celebrations, but also in our grief, our frustration, our pain at what is happening in our world. I know that I will find like-minded souls here, and we can commiserate and work together to bring our focus back to our own faith community, where we view the world through the seven principles that guide our lives. This is where we are doing what we can to make things better. It gives me some hope. Again, in Siddons' words: "It is orderly in its ordinariness, it is reassuring in its familiarity, and it is mine. . . I can keep my finger on it. I can tote it up and leaf through it." I am so grateful for all of you, for the warmth and welcome I find in this place, and for the solace it gives me when the world outside gets to be just too much.

HIGHLIGHTS: MAY 10, 2016 UUSD BOARD OF TRUSTEES MEETING

Consent Agenda: The Consent Agenda, consisting of the April 12, 2016 Board meeting minutes, Financial report, and the Interim Minister's report, was approved.

Financial Report: Gary Colangelo, Finance Officer

- Gary noted April's income was a little over \$11,000, and he expected the net income for the year to be in the \$15,000 to \$20,000 range if trends continue.
- The Capital Budget is being formatted to be consistent with the other financial reports and should be available for the June Board Meeting.

Proposal from Clean Energy Delaware USA

• The Property Management Committee evaluated the Clean Energy USA proposal to add solar panels to the sanctuary. Based on the energy cost savings, Property Management stated the economics make sense and going solar is in line with our values. The Board authorized Property Management to begin discussions with Clean Energy with the intent to have a contractual arrangement for having solar panels installed in the near future.

2016-17 Operating and Capital Budget: Joanne Saltzberg and Dan Payne, Finance Co-Chairs

• The Board approved the Budgets, which were recommended by the Finance Committee. On the Operating Budget side, Joanne took the lead and noted strong stewardship results of almost \$183,000 coupled with prudent management of expenses allowed the Finance Committee to recommend the Board submit the budget to the

congregation for approval. Up to \$15,000 was provided for minister search costs and a contingency fund of some \$14,000 was established to handle revenue shortfalls and unanticipated costs.

• On the Capital side, the \$50,000 consists of \$42,460 of debt reduction, the balance being equipment and improvements.

Update on Selection of Ministerial Search Committee

• The Board approved Len Bowman, Jean Charles, Jeff Cordiano, Deb Davies, and Betty Kirk to be members of the Ministerial Search Committee. A meeting amongst them, the Board, and Rev. Pyle will be scheduled.

Approval of Delegates to GA 2016 in Columbus

• Pat and Ron Schaeffer were approved as delegates. Rev. Paula, by virtue of her position, is also an approved delegate.

Congregational Meeting Planning

• The notice of the Annual meeting along with documents including on-site ballots will be sent out by May 12 to congregants. Absentee ballots will be mailed no later than June 5.

NEXT BOARD MEETING: The next Board meeting will be held on Tuesday, June 7 instead of Tuesday, June 14 so as to precede the Annual Meeting on Sunday, June 12.

THE EDICT OF TORDA – RELIGIOUS FREEDOM

In another part of this newsletter, you will find an article by Ceil Toth, Chair of our Partner Church Committee. Ceil reminds us of two wall hangings we received as gifts from our Partner Church in Tordatur, Romania, which hang in our building entrance. One is a copy of a famous painting of Ferenc David and the 1568 Proclamation of Religious Freedom of Torda completed in 1896 by Aladar Korosfoi-Kriesch. The original is on display in the City Museum of Budapest. The second is a copy of the edict itself. I thought it might be helpful to provide a little history around these beautiful gifts.



Although Americans are proud of our early constitutional mandate for the concept of separation of church and state, it really started at the Diet of Torda in January, 1568 with the Edict of Torda, which declared official toleration for all religions in Transylvania. This was the result of a public debate between a Unitarian minister (Ferenc David) and a Calvinist bishop (Peter Melius), and David's argument prevailed with the King. It was the first time in Western history, where preachers and congregations were permitted to follow a religion other than the State's decreed religion, and it resulted

from the tireless determination of Unitarian minister, Ferenc David. The Edict was not perfect, applying to only four religions at the time, but it established a precedent that was to eventually spread to other parts of Europe.

Again, in January of 1782, the Emperor of Austria issued the Edict of Toleration, giving Unitarians legal rights to worship according to their consciences. In both cases, a small community of Unitarians, in what is today Eastern Europe, pressed for their religious rights and broke ground for everyone. That's how it seems to happen — one step at a time somewhere in the world, people making a difference that impacts us all —another example of our interconnection across borders, time, and cultures.

Finally, some brief thoughts on our Fifth Principle — *The right of conscience and the use of the democratic process within our congregations and in society at large.* As a member of this congregation, you have a unique responsibility to influence its future through your active participation, which includes your vote for volunteers who offer to serve, and for resolutions and decisions that impact our outreach and wellbeing as a community. Please meet this minimum standard of membership — make your voice heard and vote at the annual meeting.

ADD WORLD OCEAN DAY TO JUNE CELEBRATIONS

Father's Day, solstice, graduations, and weddings — there is just so much to celebrate in June! There is one day that may not be first on your radar, but as residents near the coast, you probably would want it to be.

In 2008, the United Nations officially designated June 8 as a day to honor the part of the planet covered in water, which is to say, most of it. These days, it is a growing <u>global event</u> with an emphasis on education and preservation. Because we do so much celebrating as a community of faith, I think it is important to ask us to focus on what we can do to reduce the giant patch of plastic soup the size of Texas, so large it can be seen from space, sitting in the middle of the Pacific Ocean.

Taking a look at the Great Pacific Garbage Patch is a sobering way to realize there is no "away" when it comes to trash, especially trash that lacks the ability to decompose.

So celebrate and celebrate this June and the whole year around, but do it without purchasing plastics! Biodegradable paper plates are available, and with a dishwasher, no problem with using real silverware, or at least ones to reuse if they are plastic.

Let's bring our own tote bags to the grocery store, and not complain about the no balloons rule on our property. I recommended that policy to the Rental & Usage Subcommittee, who were eager to adopt it when they understood the reason.

Perhaps we can even act like the Scouts who take a metal container with their own plates and utensils on camping trips.

The range of possibilities is endless although possibly inconvenient. But it is an inconvenience well worth it, and I've made my own commitment to not purchasing any new plastics.

PASTORAL CARE HOSTS FIRST REGIONAL WORKSHOP HELD AT UUSD ON APRIL 30 — Dianne Conine, Chair

The workshop was the first of its kind in our new church home and was facilitated by Rev. David Pyle, District Executive of the Joseph Priestley District. Pyle for CER congregational Pastoral Care Teams and focused on active listening skills, visitation skills, and helping people with difficult decisions. There were 21

participants including Rev. Paula and Rev. Pyle. UU congregations represented were Easton; Salisbury; Newark; Mill Creek; Towson; Chester River; Harford Co., Maryland; Bull Run, Virginia; and UUSD.

LEADERSHIP DEVELOPMENT

ELECTION FOR BOARD OF TRUSTEES AND LEADERSHIP DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE APPROACHES — Ed Fick; Kaz Huston, Chair; and Lee Summerville

With the close of the self-nomination process, the ballot for elections at the June 12 Annual Meeting is taking shape. We were fortunate to have several members step forward to offer their services. Gary Colangelo, Gwen Johnson, and Patricia Murdock filed for the Board of Trustees (BOT). Kath Johnson and Ruth Lamothe submitted their names for the Leadership Development Committee (LDC).

There are two open seats on the LDC, an independent three-member committee established by the UUSD by-laws. Members serve for two-year terms. A prime function of the LDC is running the nomination process for itself and the Board of Trustees. The BOT also has two-year terms and has seven members.

Currently there are three candidates for the four open BOT seats. Other candidates may be nominated from the floor of the Annual Meeting. Eligible members may nominate themselves or be nominated by another UUSD member. The nominee should be present to accept nomination and speak to their interest and qualifications for the position. While the time for completing the self-nomination form is past, that form is available on the website and in the Gathering Area, and may serve as a reference regarding the points to be addressed.

If the Board does not reach a full compliment through election, it may appoint someone to fill the vacant seat; however, it would be most desirable to begin the new term with a complete BOT elected by the members of UUSD.

It is critical that we have a fully staffed Board of Trustees as we proceed during this exciting and challenging period in the life of the church. Please consider serving or urge someone you believe to be a good candidate to offer his or her

SOCIAL & ENVIRONMENTAL JUSTICE (S&EJ)

March to End Discrimination: It was cold and wet, but on April 29, UUSD members participated in a march and demonstration to end discriminatory hiring practices in Delaware state government employment. A series of "listening sessions" conducted by the chapters of the **DE NAACP** across the state confirmed a pattern of bias in hiring, promotions, and discipline. The effort has resulted in a report to Governor Markell making several recommendations for changes in practices and for holding managers accountable for discriminatory acts.

Get Out the Vote! UUSD is participating with the League of Women Voters of Sussex County this year to help register citizens to vote and to get voters to polls for this important election year. The League is targeting those communities that have been most disenfranchised in the past — African Americans and Hispanics. The Fifth UUA principle is "The right of conscience and the use of the democratic process within our congregations and in society at large." As such, UU congregations around the country have historically participated in registration drives and get out the vote efforts. Volunteers are needed to stuff envelopes, staff tables at events, make phone calls or walk through neighborhoods. Spanish speakers are needed. All help is appreciated. WALL HANGINGS ARE GIFTS FROM REV. BODOR AND THE TORDATUR CONGREGATION — Ceil Toth, Chair

Have you noticed the two wall hangings at the East entrance to our church? One is a sepia colored photogravure that hangs in most Unitarian churches and many homes in Transylvania. It is a copy of a famous painting of Ferenc David and the 1568 Proclamation of Religious Freedom at Torda. On January 13 of this year, the Hungarian Unitarian Church celebrated the 448th Anniversary of the Declaration of Religious Freedom and Tolerance, an edict which might be considered the first legal guarantee of religious freedom in Christian Europe. The Hungarian Unitarians celebrate this special day with events in Torda and Kolozsvar, two cities in the Transylvanian part of Romania near Tordatur, our Partner Church village. The other wall hanging is a copy of the edict. Both were gifts from Rev. Bodor and the Tordatur Congregation. A special thank you goes to them and to Kris Acker for framing and hanging them.
