PRESIDENT'S COLUMN — GARY COLANGELO



"Yesterday is history, tomorrow is a mystery, today is God's gift, that's why we call it the present.

Can we talk?"

Joan Rivers, the pioneer female stand-up comedian, would pause in her routine with an emphatic, "Can we talk?" The way she delivered this phrase told me she wanted to do more than talk. Was Joan also saying, "Can we listen?" and "Can we understand?"

Talking, listening, and understanding are the components of communication.

"The basic building block of good communication is the feeling that every human is unique and of value." If you are thinking you heard this quote by an unknown author before, you are almost correct. This is a restatement of our UU First Principle: The inherent worth and dignity of every person. Communication is a continuous process, inseparable from and essential to everything that goes on at UUSD. Communication is how we connect, share our stories, learn, and grow. Communication is important — so, "can we talk?"

Communication is a complex process and full of pitfalls. A few wise people in the past had something to say about this:

- "The single biggest problem in communication is the illusion it has taken place." George Bernard Shaw
- "The more elaborate our means of communication, the less we communicate." Joseph Priestley
- "Many attempts to communicate are nullified by saying too much." Robert Greenleaf

And from the Bible —

- "A fool has no delight in understanding, but in expressing his own heart. He answers a matter before he hears it, it is folly and shame to him." Proverbs 18:2, 13 (King James Version)
- "In the multitude of words sin is not lacking, but he who restrains his lips is wise." Proverbs 10:19 (KJV)
- "Let no corrupt word proceed out of your mouth, but what is good for necessary edification, that it may impart grace to the hearers." Ephesians 4:29 (KJV)

In our time at UUSD, we have witnessed eloquence, gaffs, embarrassment, pain, wonderment, confusion, anger, growth, and spiritual connectedness through communication.

Two of the six covenants from Our Covenant of Good Relations state:

- I will speak from my own experience; and
- I will speak responsibly and directly with those with whom I have conflict and honor our differences.

Effective communication is woven into the fabric of UUSD and Unitarian Universalism, as well as our everyday experiences at home, work, and play. Becoming aware of the effectiveness of our own communication skills (talking, listening, and understanding) can be a rewarding part of spiritual growth.

I plan to continue discussing communication at UUSD for the next few President's Columns. Next month we can explore together the importance of communication with UUSD leaders, including the Minister, Board of Trustees, and committees.

As some of you know, I have entered the Religious Educators Credentialing program as of this past spring. One of the requirements of credentialing is to attend several trainings to expand my knowledge and learn "best practices" to help our education programs grow in a healthy way, instead of playing catch-up down the road. I attended one of these trainings a few weeks ago in Ocean Grove, NJ. The Leadership School for Religious Educators was a three-day workshop exploring team building, trust, and conflict management with respect to committees, volunteers, leaders (both staff and lay), and the congregation as a whole. Through these workshops, I am able to communicate with colleagues in similar sized churches as well as large ones. We discuss particular programs in place, challenges we

face, and how we have resolved problems that others are currently facing. We also role-play and problem-solve to help us be better prepared for common situations. Self-assessments are also given to help us identify strengths and areas that may require some attention. These trainings are vital to the growth and support of our programs and I am grateful to have the opportunity to attend.

NEWS FROM YOUR UUSD BOARD OF TRUSTEES

HIGHLIGHTS: AUGUST 16 UUSD BOARD OF TRUSTEES MEETING

— Gwen Johnson, Secretary, Board of Trustees

Financial Report: Pat Murdock, Finance Officer

- Pat discussed the June financial reports and said UUSD's cash position was "solid." The BOT approved the financial reports. Pat said the challenge will be paying the mortgage, which is currently \$5,622 a month. Pat reported that she and Dan Payne had discussions with Sussex County Federal Credit Union (SCFCU) to determine if UUSD could modify its Promissory Note with them to reduce UUSD's monthly payments. As a result, the SCFCU agreed to a one-time adjustment that will lower UUSD's payment by approximately \$4,900 per year.
- The BOT unanimously approved a motion for Gary and Pat to sign the Modification to our Promissory Note with SCFCU, which will have the immediate effect of reducing UUSD's monthly payments, with no prepayment or other penalties, on our Commercial Real Estate Loan for UUSD's new church building. The term of the loan will remain unchanged.

Orientation for New Opening for Worship Services Beginning in September: Rev. Paula Maiorano

- Rev. Paula has proposed changing the opening for worship services. She said the vote taken by the previous BOT not to change the BOT's role in the opening of the worship service was not an official vote. Rev. Paula said either Gary Colangelo or Walt Smith recommended at that meeting that she talk to the Worship Committee about this.
- There was about a twenty minute discussion during this meeting as to whether the BOT representative should begin the morning service or if the service should open with the Minister welcoming the congregation, followed by the BOT representative, and then the worship associate.
- Jean Charles said that she learned in a class that she attended during General Assembly that many of the UU churches are no longer opening their services with the BOT representatives. The trend is to have the UU minister open the service.
- After much discussion, the BOT voted whether to have the BOT representative stay as a part of the Worship Committee's proposed opening or not participate at all in the opening. Gwen Johnson, Pat Murdock, and

- Sharon Herb voted not to include BOT representative in the service, and Gary Colangelo, Wayne Lunstead, and Joyce Fitch voted to include the BOT representative in the service.
- Gary has asked that the BOT members and Jean Charles (Jean was asked by Gary as the Chair of the Worship Committee) informally canvass congregation members to find out which they prefer (including the BOT representative as part of the opening of the service or not and using the opening (http://www.uussd.org/images/2016-Aug-BOT-Meeting/Proposed-New-Worship-Service-Format.pdf) that Rev. Maiorano provided at this meeting. The issue is on the September BOT agenda for further discussion.

Follow up: Board Meeting Date and Time

• This was revisited from the previous BOT meeting. The consensus was to keep the BOT meeting time of 7:00 p.m. and the same date, the second Tuesday of each month.

Board Retreat: Gary Colangelo, President

• The BOT retreat will be on Thursday, September 29, 2016 from 9 a.m.-3 p.m. in the Gathering Area of UUSD.

Report on Property Management: Gary Schmidt, Co-Chair

- Gary reported on items contained in the "Property Management Committee Report, 9 August 2016" (http://www.uussd.org/images/2016-Aug-BOT-Meeting/Property-Management-Comm-Report-July-2016.pdf.
- Gary said UUSD will receive a "sub sign" donation from the sign company where Rick Welk works. This sign will hang under the UUSD sign and will provide times for our services and other information.

Report on Long Range Plan: Joanne Saltzberg, Chair

- Joanne said there was an extensive article in the July newsletter that provided updated information on UUSD's Growth Plan. Joanne encouraged everyone to read "UUSD 2015 to 2017 Growth Plan" (http://www.uussd.org/images/2016-Aug-BOT-Meeting/Growth-Plan-Handout.pdf).
- Joanne said some of the items that came from the growth plan workshops have already been implemented in Fundraising and Finance. Joanne said she hopes to finish the Growth Plan by the end of this fiscal year.

Report on Ministerial Search: Jean Charles, Chair

• Jean asked if any BOT members can take minutes at cottage meetings for the Ministerial Search Committee, and Wayne, Joyce, Sharon, and Gary offered to help.

UU Humanist Open Letter to UUA and Petition Regarding the Boy Scouts of America (BSA): Ron Schaeffer

- The UU Humanists have submitted an "Open Letter to the UUA on Renewed Relations with the Boy Scouts of America." The letter and petition involves the issue of the BSA having made progress toward inclusiveness around sexual orientation, but it still requires that all boys and volunteers sign a statement that recognizes "God as the ruling and leading power in the universe."
- Ron requested BOT approval to get signatures on a petition that would call on the UUA to make a public statement disagreeing with the BSA policy, pledge to work with the BSA to get this requirement changed, and to work with other organizations to remove this discrimination. The BOT unanimously approved this request.

Board Executive Session: The Board voted to move into Executive Session to discuss recommendations for congregational representatives for the negotiation team, Ministerial Search Committee, special pledge to enhance the artistic quality and expand the activity of the UUSD choir.

DID YOU KNOW? — RON SCHAEFFER

THE YEAR OF THE WOMAN SERIES Part III: Susan Brownell Anthony

In July, I began a series of monthly articles on famous Unitarian and Universalist women, who played key roles in the suffrage movement in the U.S. Many women from different backgrounds and faiths played important roles in bringing about the right to vote for women in 1920, however, the leadership, and particularly the early leadership, came from women, who also found their religious faith in Unitarian or Universalist congregations. So far, I have provided brief sketches of Lucy Stone and Julia Ward Howe, and this month I highlight Susan B. Anthony.



Susan B. Anthony was born in a prosperous Quaker family in 1820 in Adams, Massachusetts. She attended a Friends seminary in Philadelphia and trained to be a teacher because her father had taught her that every individual should be self-supporting. The family moved several more times, and she finally wound up in Rochester, NY in 1845, and she taught in surrounding towns. There, the Society of Friends was opposed to the abolition of slavery so the family joined the Unitarian church in Rochester, which was a part of the Underground Railroad and the home of Frederick Douglass.

She wrote in her memoirs that she found a spiritual home in Unitarianism. "Under the preaching of my reverend friend William Ellery Channing, my spirit was born anew." It was there in 1851 that she became a devoted close friend with Elizabeth Cady Stanton, and together in 1869, they formed the National Woman Suffrage Association. In 1872, Susan went to the polls in Rochester and claimed the right to vote under the Fourteenth Amendment, adopted four years earlier, providing for "equal protection" for all citizens. It did not address suffrage directly, which the Fifteenth Amendment, adopted in 1870, did for Black males. She was arrested but refused to pay the fine and was never imprisoned. During this period, she and Stanton had lost some of their support, because they had insisted that the right to vote be withheld from African American men, recently freed from slavery, until it was also given to all women. You will recall that Lucy Stone and Julia Ward Howe took the opposite position and campaigned for the vote for African American men arguing that they needed it to survive.

In 1892, she became president of the newly merged National American Woman Suffrage Association, rejoining with Lucy Stone and Julia Ward Howe, and she held this position until she retired at age 80 in 1900. Just one month before her death in March 1906, she gave her final speech at a woman's suffrage convention exclaiming, "Failure is impossible." She would be proven right 14 years later.

Next month, I will highlight Elizabeth Cady Stanton.

UPDATES FROM THE MINISTERIAL SEARCH COMMITTEE — JEAN CHARLES, CHAIR; MEMBERS LEN BOWMAN, JEFF CORDIANO, DEBRA DAVIES, & BETTY KIRK

Many thanks go to all who responded to the congregational survey. The survey is a very important part of our effort to find the settled minister who is "just right" for UUSD, and we appreciate the time and patience it took for you to fill it out. We had 113 respondents, including 101 of 128 members, or an 80% response rate from members.

The survey results will soon be available on the Ministerial Search page of the UUSD website. The Search Committee is developing a PowerPoint summary of the results, and the complete analysis of the survey will be

posted as well, including all responses to the open-ended questions. Please review the survey results as soon as they're posted (you'll be notified by email). The small group ("cottage") discussions in September will build on the survey results. Again, many thanks.

UPCOMING SEARCH COMMITTEE WORKSHOP ON OCTOBER 30: BEYOND CATEGORICAL THINKING

"Will the new minister hear me? Will my concerns and needs be met? Will the minister understand what I'm living with? How will the community respond to our minister?"

In answering these questions, a picture of the "ideal minister" (categorized by age, gender, gender identity, nationality, physical ability, race, and sexual orientation) comes to mind. With this picture in place, it can be easy to unintentionally exclude ministers who fall into certain categories. At times, as we get caught up in comparing candidates to our "picture," we can even forget what it is we hoped for in a minister.

On Sunday, October 30, UUSD will participate in the *Beyond Categorical Thinking* (BCT) workshop offered by the Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA) for congregations involved in the search for a new minister. The UUSD Search Committee invites all congregational leaders, members, and friends to participate in this workshop.

The **Beyond Categorical Thinking** program is designed to promote inclusive thinking and help prevent unfair discrimination in the search process for a new minister. This program includes a Sunday morning service with BCT workshop facilitators followed by a three-hour workshop. In the workshop, UUSD members will:

- Consider the hopes, expectations, and concerns they have for a new minister;
- Learn more about the ministerial search process; and
- Explore how thinking categorically about people sometimes interferes with choosing the best candidate.

Come to the October 30 Sunday service and remain after coffee hour (11:30 a.m.-2:30 p.m.) to participate in this UUA-sponsored three-hour workshop.

The selection of a minister is important. The Beyond Categorical Thinking workshop is another opportunity for everyone in our congregation to be a part of that process. This experience will provide guidance for the search committee in our work.

PROPERTY MANAGEMENT

The Property Management Committee (PMC) has been busy this summer, and has also been working collaboratively with a number of committees regarding use of the UUSD facility. We've dealt with, among other things, launching a review of safety and security issues, our successful conversion to solar, fallen limbs, and the discovery that at least one local fisherman was fishing the pond from our property on a regular basis.

We now have several subcommittees and teams, all involved in some aspect of caring for and maintaining our building and grounds:

- The Landscape Management Subcommittee oversees the grounds, and has put in many hours of work doing planting, watering, weeding, and all of the other tasks involved in keeping a beautiful setting for our building. They have also pursued opportunities to get free or reasonably priced assistance in landscape planning and tree health and maintenance.
- The Rental and Usage Subcommittee works with those in UUSD who are planning events and with potential renters. We have had several rental events, and have at least one renter meeting here regularly.
- The Energy Team is a hardworking group that monitors our usage and utility bills, works with our vendors/suppliers, and has overseen the conversion to solar.

• The Audiovisual Team maintains and operates our audiovisual equipment in the sanctuary, on Sunday mornings and for other events.

We've been working closely with the committees that have events coming up, or that are conducting donation drives of some kind, just to ensure that the committees have what they need in the way of space, and so that we avoid conflicts in usage of the building. You have probably noticed that during donation drives, we now have space set aside in the back of the sanctuary for collection of items brought in, such as the late August school supply collection. We hope that all groups and committees planning an event or those who are aware of a rental opportunity will get in touch with PMC. As this is written, we are looking forward to a successful yard sale, as the Fundraising Committee and PMC met early on to discuss plans, and event preparation went smoothly. We had (as we so often do at UUSD) a great committee effort, with incredibly dedicated and hardworking volunteers, and therefore, another successful event!

One of our fall projects will be cleaning and organizing the various storage spaces, including the attic space.

DENOMINATIONAL AFFAIRS PBS FILM ON UUS DEFYING THE NAZIS AIRS TUESDAY, SEPTEMBER 20 AT 9PM

A long-awaited film — *Defying the Nazis: the Sharps' War* — tells the true story of an American couple's courageous mission in 1939 to help refugees escape Nazi-occupied Europe. The film will air on *Tuesday, September 20 at 9:00 p.m.* on your local PBS station.

This film by Ken Burns and Artemis Joukowsky tells the story of Waitstill and Martha Sharp, a Unitarian minister and his wife from Wellesley, Massachusetts, who engaged in several life-threatening missions in Europe on the eve of World War II to help save hundreds of political dissidents and Jewish refugees fleeing the Nazi occupation across Europe. Their story is told in the film through letters and journals of the Sharps, with Tom Hanks as the voice of Waitstill and Marina Goldman as the voice of Martha. The film also features firsthand interviews with the now adult children whom the Sharps saved, and leading historians, authors, and Holocaust scholars.

This film was endorsed by Rev. Peter Morales, President of the Unitarian Universalist Association, and Rev. William Schultz, former President of the Board of the Unitarian Universalist Service Committee. See: http://www.defyingthenazis.org/endorsements.html.

There is a *UUA Action Project* associated with this film that asks how are we carrying on the Sharps' legacy by defying hatred and discrimination today. The project points out that Islamophobia and the Syrian refugee crisis are modern day parallels to the bigotry the Sharps fought against. ADULT EDUCATION UPCOMING UUSD ADULT EDUCATION CLASSES IN 2016

The fall will be a busy time for adult education classes. Beginning in September, the following will be offered:

- 1. Exploring the UU Seven Principles in Depth: Beginning on Saturday, September 10 from 10:00 a.m. to noon, and running for four classes, ending on October 1, Rev. Paula Maiorano, UUSD Interim Minister, and Betty Kirk will facilitate in-depth discussions of our UU seven principles. The fee for the class is \$22, which includes \$12 for a book on the principles.
- 2. **Honey in the Heart:** A 10-week UUSD journal writing class will be held on **Tuesdays, September 13 to November 22 from 1:30 p.m. to 3:30 p.m.** Rev. Paula Maiorano and Claire Griffith will facilitate the course. Journal writing uses memory and imagination as a creative force for documenting your experiences of the world. It can help to heal, inform, and inspire greater understanding of your personal history. The book *Storycatcher* by Christina Baldwin will be used as a weekly map for capturing the dynamics of putting your story on paper for generations to come. There is a \$10 class fee plus purchase of the book. The class is open to all.
- 3. *UU101*: For two *Saturdays, October 15 and 22 from 10 a.m. to 1:00 p.m.*, Rev. Paula, Len Bowman, and Betty Kirk will conduct an introduction to UU beliefs, values, history, and UUSD history and governance. The class is open to newcomers or anyone interested in increasing their understanding of Unitarian Universalism and how it fits into one's own spiritual path.

- 4. Four Spiritualities: Expression of Self, Expression of Spirit: On Sunday mornings, from 8:30 a.m. 9:30 a.m., UUSD members Mac and Sue Goekler will conduct this class, which explores learning to understand our and other's behaviors in a strictly non-judgmental way. This is a great way for UUs to learn to work with each other in team settings and explore why we react to situations in different ways. Classes will start on October 2 and run through November 20.
