

February 5 — What Does Her Life Have to Say to Us Today? — Rev. Paula Maiorano, Interim Minister: The Eva Peron museum was opened in Buenos Aires in 2002, fifty years after the death of Eva Peron, wife of Argentine President Juan Peron, at the age of thirty-three. The museum not only memorializes but also assists the visitor with understanding what is fact, fiction, or myth about this charismatic yet controversial Argentine woman, who came to be known as Evita to her beloved decamisados (shirtless ones) and to the world. Inspired by her visit to the museum on her recent South American trip, Rev. Maiorano ponders what Eva Peron's/Evita's life has to say to those of us in today's U.S. political age who believe that our most cherished religious values, and even life itself are threatened.

February 12 — Speaking of Love — Rev. Paula Maiorano, Interim Minister: One wit humorously observed that English has more names for different kinds of coffee — regular, espresso, cappuccino, latte — than it does for different kinds of love. Not so for the ancient Greeks, who had different names for love in a multiplicity of forms. Specialists teach that the more words for something a language has the more important it is to the culture of that language. This service explores the Greek words for love with suggestions for English adaptations that will emphasize love's importance to us, not only in this season of Valentine, but also for our lifelong commitment to Standing on the Side Love.

February 19 — Reflections on Democracy and Religion — Rev. Paula Maiorano, Interim Minister:

The fifth principle which Unitarian Universalists (UU) affirm and promote as one of their basic seven principles forming our UU covenant is the right of conscience and the use of the democratic process

within our congregations and within society at large. This service explores what is behind our belief that democracy is a religious value, and how we participate with others who would legislate morality from religious beliefs that differ from ours.

February 26 — "**Share the Love Sunday**" — **UUSD Social & Environmental Justice Committee:** The S&EJ Committee presents its annual service reaffirming UUSD's commitment to social justice and community service. This year, we will honor "The Way Home," which provides exoffenders coming out of prison with a wide variety of services to help them turn their lives around and stay out of prison. Come, hear staff and past clients speak about the program, its successes, and its needs. At this service, we will kick off UUSD's new "Share the Plate" program, where 50% of the offering (over pledged amounts) will be donated to the organization.

THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES APPROVES EXECUTIVE TEAM

The Board of Trustees approved the Executive Team Charge at its January meeting. Some members have asked good questions about the Team, so here is a Q & A to answer questions you may have:

What is the purpose of the Executive Team? The UUSD Executive Team will be appointed by the Board of Trustees to manage the operations of UUSD.

Why did the Board create the Executive Team? There are two reasons to form the Executive Team:

- The BOT is transitioning to a congregational board and needs to focus on fiduciary, policy, planning, and assessment responsibilities, and must therefore delegate UUSD operations to allow the Board to concentrate on their core tasks.
- Our Minister is the UUSD chief administrator, but currently has no paid administrative support. A functioning Executive Team will allow our settled minister to effectively serve as chief administrator and fulfill all other ministerial responsibilities.

Who is on the Team? The Team will be composed of the Minister and two members who understand the culture of UUSD. The member appointees should have administrative experience (especially financial and information management). Member appointees cannot be BOT members and, preferably, are not serving in any other UUSD leadership position. Members will serve two-year terms and can be reappointed for up to three terms.

What will the Team do? Responsibilities of the Team include oversight and coordination of financial management, building operations and management, human resource management, information management and UUSD general administration. Administrative functions and policy development will continue in the relevant Board committees (Finance, Property Management, Land and Building, Personnel, and Communications), allowing the Executive Team to focus on oversight and coordination. However, Human Resource Management, Information Management, and General Administration will require a more hands-on approach.

Can I serve on the Executive Team? Yes. This is an opportunity to be of great service in managing UUSD as it grows and fulfills its Mission. For more information or to request consideration, please contact <u>Gary Colangelo</u>.

NEWS FROM YOUR UUSD BOARD OF TRUSTEES

HIGHLIGHTS: JANUARY 10, 2017 UUSD BOARD OF TRUSTEES (BOT) MEETING — Gwen Johnson, Secretary, Board of Trustees

Approved: The Board approved the minutes of the December 13, 2016 meeting and the Financial Report. An Interim Minister's report was not provided as Rev. Paula was on vacation.

Financial Reports: Pat Murdock, Finance Officer: Pat said we are in a strong financial position.

Announcements: Gary Colangelo, President: Gary said Walt Smith had resigned from the Board of Trustees for health reasons.

Committee Reports

- **Property (PM) Management:** Gary Schmidt, Co-Chair, reported on items contained in the "Property Management Committee (PMC) Report dated January 10, 2016," The PMC will have a roundtable discussion for the congregation with wants and needs for the future on February 5, 2017.
- Social & Environmental Justice: Don Peterson, Chair, presented a proposed Refugee Resettlement Program to the BOT. He believes that UUSD should stand behind this program. This program is run by Jewish Family Services of Wilmington, Delaware will allow UUSD to collaborate with the leaders of the Progressive Interfaith Alliance (and others) that are forming the Sussex County Refugee Resettlement Coalition. UUSD would not be sponsoring a refugee specifically; UUSD would be helping as a coalition member. The BOT unanimously approved this motion.
- *Land and Building*: Allan Cairncross requested, and the BOT unanimously approved, up to \$8,550 from Capital Funds to pay for Parking Proposal dated January 10, 2017. The PMC, Finance, and Land and Building have all reviewed and approved these items as necessary to address the need for additional parking spaces. Allan said for approximately \$6,000, UUSD can add 38 parking spaces quickly.
- *Growth Plan Update: Workshop on November 30: JoAnne Saltzberg, Growth Plan Coordinator*, discussed the BOT's role in taking over the Growth Plan. The Growth Plan Report to the BOT dated January 10, 2017 is available on the website.

Additional Board Approvals

- *Safe Deposit Box Access:* The Board unanimously approved access for Pat Murdock, Finance Officer, to the Community Bank of Delaware, Rehoboth Beach, safe deposit box and removal of Dan Payne, former Finance Officer, from safe deposit box access.
- *Authorized Check Signers*: The Board unanimously approved authorizing Gary Colangelo, President, and Pat Murdock, Finance Officer, to sign checks at PNC Bank, Rehoboth Beach, Delaware, and removing Dan Payne, former Finance Officer, as a check signer.

- *Executive Team Charge*: The BOT unanimously approved the Executive Team Charge with minor changes.
- *Lay Leader Honoree Designation:* The BOT unanimously agreed to table discussion of the Lay Leader Honoree designation .

UUA GENERAL ASSEMBLY IN NEW ORLEANS



UUA GENERAL ASSEMBLY

This year the Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA) will hold its annual General Assembly (GA) in New Orleans, Louisiana at the Ernest N. Morial Convention Center, on June 21 -25. The GA theme this year is *Resist and Rejoice*, with a focus on social justice work. As the UUA describes it, GA attendees will worship, witness, learn, connect, and make policy for the Association through the democratic process.

The history of nationwide annual meetings for our denomination goes back to 1825 with the formation of the American Unitarian Association (AUA), and its first meeting in Boston. The Universalists, although forming earlier, tended to meet at state conventions and did not hold a nationwide meeting until late in the nineteenth century. With the merger of the Unitarians and the Universalists in 1961, GA has continued, but with an increased emphasis on education and social action initiatives.

Another noteworthy event occurred in 1920 when Harriet Ware contributed \$5,000 to start an annual lecture to be given each year at the AUA annual meeting on "contemporary religion and pure Christianity." The first lecture, named "The Ware Lecture," was given in 1922 and every year since with the exception of 1945 (WWII) and 1950 (125th anniversary celebration). This year's Ware Lecturer is expected to be announced shortly in a special roll-out, so it could be a significant personality. A sample list of past Ware Lecturers includes Reinhold Niebuhr (1934), Linus Pauling (1964), Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. (1966), Elliot Richardson (1974), Kurt Vonnegut (1986), Karen Armstrong (2011), and Cornel West in 2015.

There is significantly more to a GA today, with over 125 workshops open to all registered attendees, on theology, governance, ministry and social justice topics. There is also a business agenda for voting on bylaw changes and policy decisions. Each congregation is entitled to representatives based on its membership size. We are currently entitled to three representatives (delegates), in addition to the minister. Once members identify their intent to attend GA, they will be asked about their interest in being a delegate, and the UUSD Board will officially select our three delegates from that list. The congregation's minister is automatically a delegate.

Next year, GA will be held in Kansas City, Missouri on June 20-24, 2018. Think about it. Maybe you can tie in a vacation or family visit.

CAPITAL CAMPAIGN

This month we are celebrating the three-year anniversary of the Capital Campaign for our new home, which began in December 2014. The campaign results are a miracle of the human spirit as revealed by our congregation's commitment to joyful giving. When we started the Campaign, some thought our goals were too ambitious, but we exceeded our expectations with \$525,335 in fulfilled pledges and a \$848,694 campaign total

including pledges, gifts, grants, and in-kind contributions (Pioneer donations). The Co-chairs of the Capital Campaign want to thank UUSD members and friends for their vision, hopes, wishes, hard work, and generosity.

LAND & BUILDING UPDATE ON PARKING LOTS

The wonderful news is that UUSD attendance is growing rapidly. There were more cars than parking spaces in four of the last eight Sundays. The high point was December 11 when 156 adults attended and parked 103 cars. The problem is that UUSD only has 87 parking spaces, so 16 cars did not have parking spaces. Fortunately, almost all found reasonable spaces on the grass or edges of the parking lot. Along with this wonderful growth, the coffee hour has become very crowded (still nice), and classrooms and meeting spaces are getting very busy. This has prompted a rebirth of the Land and Building Committee (L&BC) to consider ways to better handle this wonderful growth. Again, this is a good sign that we are on the right track. But visitors and members must have a place to park to feel welcome, or UUSD will not grow.

Some key developments:

- The Board of Trustees has approved a new charge for L&BC.
- The Board of Trustees also approved L&BC spending up to \$8,550 for immediate parking enhancements:
 - Purchase cement parking bumpers to mark temporary spaces on the grass.
 - \circ $\;$ Prune and clear trees and brush as needed to clear parking spaces.
 - Add one parking lot light pole in the middle of the new space.

For a second step, the engineering plan for another 37 permanent parking spaces is still part the original plan approved and permitted by Sussex County. These can be built as soon as UUSD finds the funding and votes approval. Meanwhile, an excellent suggestion has been made to add parking greeters to guide traffic to these new temporary spaces.

LONG RANGE PLANNING UUSD'S GROWTH PLAN YIELDS TWELVE MONTHS OF ACCOMPLISHMENTS! — Joanne Saltzberg, Chair

"...Whatever you can do, or dream you can, begin it. Boldness has genius, power, and magic in it. Begin it now." — Goethe

Late in 2015, with the paint barely dry on UUSD's new home, boldness begat boldness, when the congregation adopted a plan that affirmed that all growth is part of the one ministry that is UUSD, and that the state of interbeing extends to this UU congregation being accountable to all UU congregations. We named it *Linking and Strengthening Our Ministries of Connection*. Four bold goals were adopted:

- *I.* UUSD will be a sanctuary for lifelong spiritual growth and education.
- 2. UUSD will be a center for progressive thought and social justice.
- 3. UUSD will be a joyous haven for those who choose to stand on the side of love.
- 4. UUSD will have the resources and frameworks it needs for sustainability and growth.

These goals are supported by planning, implementation, and the leadership by UUSD's Church Council. It would be hard to find an area of congregational life that hasn't been touched in these past fourteen months by the initiatives that came from this creativity and hard work. The planned growth has been very encouraging, and a full report on the growth plan will be published in March. A report is hardly needed, though, to see a sanctuary, gathering area, and parking lot spilling over their borders; a veritable parade of children being sung out every Sunday; and a Calendar of Events that has very little white space!

And just like boldness begets boldness, growth begets growth — some of it planned and some like the "volunteer" plants and flowers that grow in fields and gardens — unexpected gifts of soil deeply cultivated or

seeds that have more to give. It may well be the "volunteers" that are the bell weather for the depth of growth at UUSD. These are a few examples:

- The Board of Trustees is carefully re-inventing itself as a Congregational Board focused on vision and growth. And, it has a plan to address leadership and management needs going forward.
- There are six committee sub-groups to keep our property in good order, and our fundraising more and more successful.
- The Holiday Craft Faire created a crafters' group open to all and now there is another craft group, The Fiber Mutt Club.
- The Land and Building Committee, disbanded after the move to this new home, is meeting once again to evaluate the needs of a congregation already bursting the seams of its new home!

My personal acronym for healthy growth is AMINO – each letter representing an important aspect of congregational growth. I use it because in our human bodies, amino acids are the building blocks of protein that play a crucial role in almost all biological processes; they are essential to grow and heal. On the Sunday after the 2016 Presidential election, UUSD's attendance spiked and the numbers have remained high. UUSD is truly a "Beacon at the Beach" for people who embrace Unitarian Universalists' affirmation that unconditional, universal love is the foundation and grounding for our actions in the world. UUSD is also essential, and helping it to grow and stay healthy is the work of an entire congregation that is doing a great job.

Sussex County Refugee Resettlement Coalition: At its January meeting, the Board of Trustees approved UUSD to become an official member of this newly formed Coalition, which will be responsible for supporting the needs of a newly resettled refugee family here in Sussex County. The Coalition consists of the members of the Progressive Interfaith Alliance and others. The refugees have gone through a rigorous "vetting" process (background checks and evaluation) by both the United Nations High Commission for Refugees and the United States government and have been cleared for entry into the country. Volunteers in the Coalition will provide much of the support in locating (but not paying for) housing and setting up a new home (through donations of services and goods), helping the re-settled individuals or families to integrate into the community, helping to locate possible employers, providing some transportation when needed, providing fellowship, etc. The Refugee Resettlement program in Delaware is run by Jewish Family Services. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Celebration in Sussex County: Even though the parade Saturday morning was cancelled because of the threatening weather, UUSD members participated in both the banquet on Saturday, January 14, and at the worship service on January 16. Our own **Roisin Greer-Roelants** made us proud at the service, reading a poem entitled "Don't Lose Faith" especially written for the occasion by Tina Miller-Hall.

S&EJ Committee Joins the DE Civil Rights Coalition: The newly formed Coalition includes over 30 organizations state-wide who have pledged to come together in a united response of long-established civil rights organizations, religious groups, civic groups, and service providers of Delaware to counter with one voice the growing threat of discrimination and hate in the nation and in Delaware. At its February meeting, the Board of Trustees will consider whether UUSD, as a congregation, will join the Coalition.

ADULT EDUCATION UUSD TO HOLD ITS SECOND DARWIN DAY CELEBRATION ON SUNDAY, FEB. 19, 3:00-5:30 p.m. Betty Kirk, Adult Education Co-Coordinator

UUSD will hold its second Darwin Day celebration on Sunday, **February 19, 2017** from **3:00** p.m. to **5:30** p.m. Our celebration this year will feature a film and two speakers. The event is free and open to the public. The film is "The Genius of Charles Darwin" featuring Richard Dawkins who explains why Darwin's theory of evolution was, indeed, a revolution. Dawkins is a well-known evolutionary biologist and author, as well as a vocal atheist.



Our first speaker is Jennifer Biddle, Assistant Professor of Marine Biosciences at the College of Earth, Ocean and Environment at the University of Delaware. She received her B.S. is Biotechnology from Rutgers University and her Ph.D. from Penn State. Dr. Biddle's research is focused on microorganisms in the environment, and understanding what they do and where they are. She examines local marine sediments, the deep biosphere, and microbialites. The title of her talk is "Maybe we are archaea: finding our start point on the tree of life."

Our second speaker is Ronald Martin, Professor of Geological Sciences, from the University of Delaware Geological Sciences Department. He grew up in southwestern Ohio, where world famous assemblages of Late Ordovician fossils drew his attention to paleontology. He received a B.S. degree in Geology and Paleontology from Bowling Green State University (Ohio), M.S. in Geology from the University of Florida, and Ph.D. in Zoology from the University of California at Berkeley. His research interests include the taphonomy (preservation) and biostratigraphy of microfossil assemblages and, most recently, the role of phytoplankton evolution in the diversification of the marine biosphere. He is the author or co-author of over 60 papers, in



addition to *Earth's Evolving System*, which was just published in its second edition. His presentation will focus on "Scales of Change: The Transfiguration of Experience by Historical Consciousness."
